

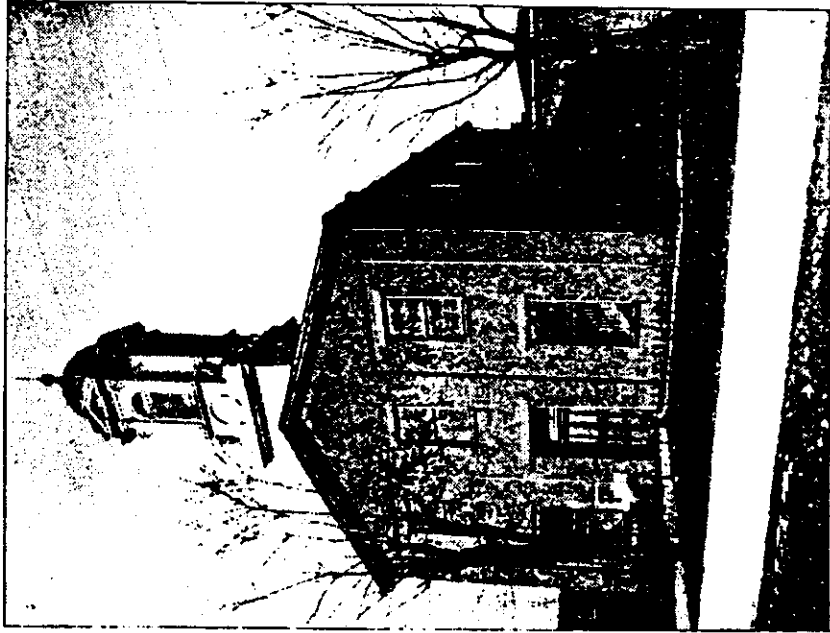

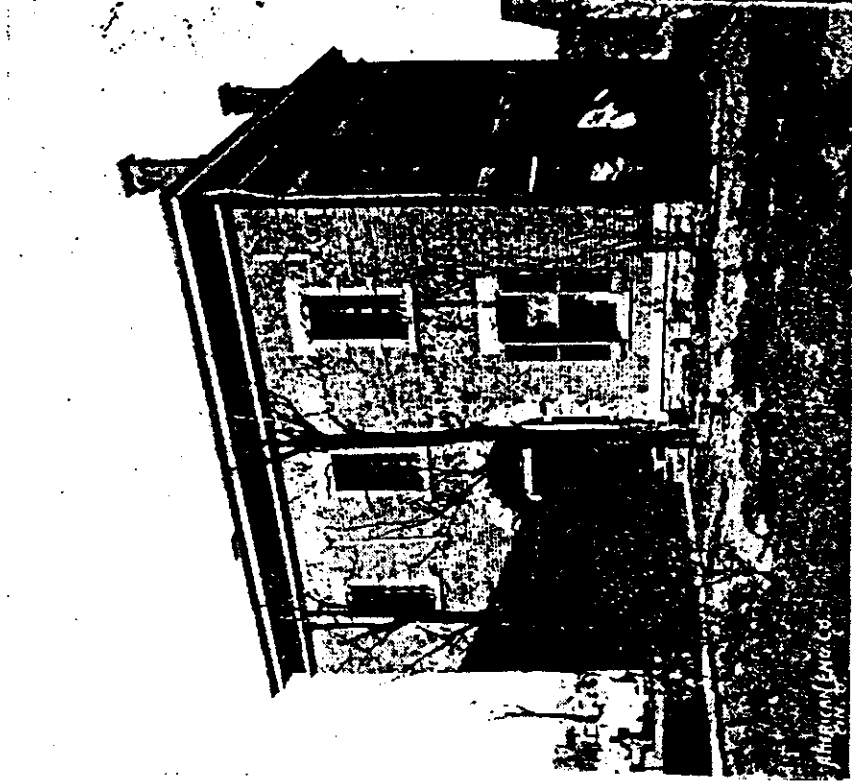

Leaving the army for good he set his face towards the home of his youth, and arrived at Mount Zion on the 20th day of April, 1865. Since that time he has married and raised a family, and has been a first-class citizen. He was commissioned to fill the vacancy in the Magisterial district of Mount Zion caused by the death of his Uncle, Barnette Franks, and was re-elected and commissioned to fill the next term in a strong Democratic district.

Mr. Tomlin has been a farmer all of his life, and owns a nice farm and a good substantial home. He is a Baptist in religion and a Republican in politics.

Mr. Tomlin was appointed to take the census last June in his district, and received a very complimentary letter in regard to his work.

September 7, 1865, he was united in marriage to Miss Fannie Bondurant of Boone county. To this union two children were born, Archie and Eva Tomlin. His first wife died in August, 1867, in Belle Plains, Iowa, where he was temporarily located. Later he was united in marriage to Dora C. Stevens, a greatniece of William Hume.
